## "Yet Not My Will..."

### The Time Had Come...

The room grew silent where the Passover Feast had been served. The conversation between Jesus and His disciples had come to a lull, and something seemed to be weighing heavily on Jesus' mind. There was so much He wanted to tell them. There was so much they wanted to hear Him say. But the feast was over now, and Jesus' attention was now drawn to far less pleasant business. In a few hours, Jesus would fulfill the purpose for which His Father had sent Him, and He was NOT anxious for it to happen. Yet, Jesus' obedience to His Father in the events that were about to take place is what makes Jesus the most heroic of all people.

In the world of comic books and motion pictures, heroes usually have superhuman powers that make them stand apart from the rest of humanity. They can fly. They can bend steel. They are bulletproof and intelligent, and good. And of course, all of these things were true of Jesus too. Had He wanted to, He could have done any of those things and much more. In fact, He DID do things that no ordinary man could do; then or now.

But, if Jesus had merely taught people wisdom and performed a few miracles, He would not at all be the hero that He truly is. You see, Jesus didn't just give OF Himself to help us; He gave ALL of Himself. And, He didn't go to the cross because He WANTED to, but because He obeyed His Father.

We hope you'll consider the Scripture passages cited in this Family Study and discuss with your family just what it is that makes for a hero; super powers, or obedience?

### Jesus Knew What Awaited Him

Even before Jesus was incarnated as a baby here on earth, He knew He would be sent to the cross. The sin of man had to be destroyed, and the only way to do that was to take all the world's sin upon Himself, and have the sin be put to death along with Him. As these Scripture passages illustrate, Jesus was always aware of what would one day happen to Him.

### Jesus Praised God In Spite of it All

At the Last Supper, Jesus enjoyed one last meal with His disciples. Soon after, He would be handed over to be tortured and put to death for the sin of the world. Yet, Jesus continued to minister to His disciples, teaching them, comforting them, and even washing their feet. And when it was all over, as Jesus began His transition from celebration to suffering, He didn't complain. He didn't fight. Instead, He sang a hymn to His Father.

### Not My Will, but Yours, be Done

It could be said that, in all of history, the greatest battle ever fought was in the garden of Gethsemane, where Jesus prayed to His Father just before being arrested. It was there where Jesus suffered in anguish before His Father, knowing of the physical and spiritual suffering that awaited Him. Soon, Jesus would undergo the most brutal torture, the most agonizing death, and the unspeakable horror of having the world's sin on His shoulders as His Father hid His face from Him. It was all in order to save the world from sin and death, but as Jesus prayed in anticipation of His suffering, He didn't FEEL like going to the cross. He didn't DESIRE what was about to happen. And, He certainly could have chosen not to follow through. But, His Father was asking Him to do it, and like the perfect sinless Hero that He is, He yielded to His Father's will. And, with one sentence out of Jesus' mouth, the war against sin was decided. "Father, if you are willing, remove this cup from me. Nevertheless, not my will, but yours, be done."

### Jesus Didn't Fight God's Will

Jesus allowed Himself to be arrested and taken into custody, even stopping His disciples from fighting for Him. He allowed the angry, hypocritical and narrow-minded people who were out to get Him to question Him, ridicule Him, torture Him, lord their supposed power over Him, and kill Him. And at any moment during His ordeal, Jesus could have called legions of angels to His defense. He could have struck them down at a mere thought. He could have crushed these men like the insects they were. But He didn't. To do so would have been to disobey His Father, and to Jesus, that simply wasn't an option. And that, more than anything else, is what makes Jesus a Hero.

### The King of Kings and Hero of Heroes

There are many reasons why Jesus should be thought of as a hero. He was wise, He was kind, and he was righteous. He made the blind see, made the crippled walk, and made the mute speak. He even raised the dead to life. His power and glory surpass the super powers of any fictitious hero ever conceived of in comic books. But without Jesus' obedience to His Father in the matter of the cross, none of us could be saved from our sin. Without His obedience to His Father - His yielding of His will to his Father's will, sacrificing Himself completely so that the unworthy could be saved - Jesus would not be the Hero that we now know Him to be. But Jesus DID obey; in all things, even at the ultimate cost to Himself.

So, what makes for a hero? It's not what you can do. It's why you do it, and whom you do it for. Are you willing to completely yield your life to God? Then you too, will be a hero.
